## **Response Cards and Formative Assessment**

## **Steps for Implementing Student Response Cards:**

- 1. <u>Determine the type of response card to use</u> Our cards print front to back and are mirror-imaged so students can use their pointer fingers and thumbs in a pinching fashion to indicate their selected answer. Both you and the student will see the same answer no matter your location.
- 2. <u>Instruct students on the acceptable procedures for using a response card</u> Instruct students on how to display their cards. For example, students can simply lay cards flat on their desks using a paper clip to indicate an answer, hold the card up when asked, or hold a card in front of their chests so others cannot see their responses.
- 3. <u>Provide the formative assessment question</u> Make sure to ask an important question that may warrant an intervention or address a misconception. The formative assessment question should be based on the student learning objective.
- 4. <u>Note responses</u> Record the percent of the class that incorrectly answered or note individual students that still have gaps in their understanding. These students may need additional small group instruction.

## **Reasons to Use Response Cards:**

- Every student has an opportunity to respond. This will help students monitor their progress toward learning goals.
- This assists teachers with monitoring students' progress toward mastering learning goals.
- The use of response cards increases student on-task behavior.
- Asking questions allows you to identify gaps in student learning while evaluating the effectiveness of your lesson.

## **Teacher Tips:**

- Do not use student responses as a grade. Use student responses to make instructional changes.
- Use response cards in the middle of class to check for student understanding during lesson.
- Assess 1 or 2 questions and make sure to provide immediate feedback.
- Pair this with a sentence stem such as: I used to think \_\_\_\_\_\_, but now I know \_\_\_\_\_\_.
